

Avoiding Spam

The best way to avoid spam is not getting on spammers' lists in the first place. Many web sites require you to sign up to access their services. Often, you need to 866-4813 provide a valid email address during the sign-up process. There's nothing wrong with that, but you never know what will happen to the email address you give to the site. For that reason it's a good idea not to use your primary email address when you sign up at a web site. Rather use an account at one of the free web-based email services such as Yahoo! Mail or Hotmail, or another secondary email address that is not critical.

Although it is not 244-5634 possible to eliminate all spam messages from your Inbox, we are continuously working with the filter software to report 375-3661 spam that gets through and put additional rules in place to catch some of the new waves that are inevitable.
